### VISITOR'S COMMENTS:

Pauline Wyrie, 337 Donahey Dr. New Philadelphia, Program Director of Main Street New Philadelphia, thanked Council for their \$10,000 donation to Main Street. Ms. Wyrie presented a petition of approximately 300 names of persons wanting to preserve the historical integrity of the Elks building. Ms. Wyrie said there might be grants available for the preservation because of the historical value of the building.

Randy Feemster, 552 Fair Ave., N.W. New Philadelphia, said there is a problem in his neighborhood with the house at 135 Sixth St. N.W. He said there are between 20-30 people living there, excessive noise, trash strewn about, etc. He asked that the housing code ordinance address this problem throughout the city.

Lillian Mollenkopf, 139 6<sup>th</sup> St. N.W., New Philadelphia, said there is steady traffic in and out of the residence at 135 6<sup>th</sup> St. blocking her driveway, leaving trash, making noise. She said living there is like living in the middle of a circus. Mayor Brodzinski will have the Health Department check on the condition at the house. President of Council Dave Johnson explained that the Law Director and Council are working on a new housing code ordinance. The last council and administration voted down a previous ordinance.

Mary Hayes, 146 Sixth St. N.W., New Philadelphia, also complained about the noise and trash from the residence at 135 Sixth St.
